The symposium was arranged at the OPD Seminar Hall of DUHS, Ojha Campus, with the sponsorship of Ferozsons Laboratories.

Symposium was attended by the Faculty of Dow University of Health Sciences, postgraduate students, family physicians and medical students of Dow International Medical and Dental College, nursing students, nursing staff and hospital support services staff. Dr. Kailash Makhejani was the Moderator of the symposium.

The first speaker was Dr. Hafeez Ullah Shaikh, Assistant Professor, Department of Gastroenterology and Hepatology, DUHS, he talked about "HBV diagnostic tests and interpretation" he informed the audience about the "Hepatitis B Tests" which includes three parts. HBsAg (Hepatitis B surface antigen) - A "nositive" or "reactive! HBsAg - A "positive" or "reactive" HBsAg test result means that the person is infected with hepatitis B. HBsAb (Hepatitis B surface antibody) A "positive" or "reactive" HBsAb test

The major complications of cirrhosis include varices, ascites, hepatic encephalopathy (HE), hepatopulmonary hypertension, hepatocellular carcinoma, hepatorenal syndrome, spontaneous bacterial peritonitis, and coagulation disorders.

Prof. Zahid Azam Head, Department of Gastroenterology and Hepatology, DUHS and Medical Superintendent of hospital spoke on "HBV Treatment" he focused on long term follow up of hepatitis B patients and

types: micro nodular, macro nodular, and mixed cirrhosis. HDV-HBV co-existence is considered the most severe form of chronic viral hepatitis due to more rapid progression towards hepatocellular careinoma and liverrelated death.

> Patients who are more likely to have HBV and HDV co-infection include indigenous populations, recipients of hemodialysis and people who inject intravenous drugs. Vaccination against hepatitis B is the only method to prevent HDV infection few months

Traditionally chronic hepatitis D is

treated with pegylated interferonalpha for at least 48 weeks, which reduces the risk of the condition worsening. But now a new drug to treat hepatitis delta has been approved by the European Commission. The drug's name is Bulevirtide which may be given alone or in combination with pegylated interferon.

Another drug Lonafarnib may prevent the hepatitis D virus from reproducing itself. Lonafarnib is a new type of treatment that attempts to control hepatitis delta by blocking a key enzyme that is needed for the

hepatitis delta virus to replicate.

Blocking this enzyme prevents a new virus from being created, which may control and even cure hepatitis delta. Dr. Amna Subhan, Associate Professor of Aga Khan University Hospital participated by video link. She spoke on "HBV Management in Pregnancy and Vaccine Prevention".




